

Measure H Construction Bond Program

Annual Report: March 2021 – February 2022





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Executive Summary

The following is a summary of the Committee's activities from March 2021 through February 2022.

On March 4, 2021, we presented the Committee's Annual Report (March 2021 – February 2021) to the Board of Trustees in public session.

The Committee met four times during this period and made site visits to Dale Jr. High School, Magnolia High School and Western High School. The Committee met on the following dates:

- We received design and construction project updates for various Measure H projects

- ➤ We received and reviewed the expenditure reports related to the Anaheim Union High School District (Orange County, California) General Obligation Bond, Election of 2014 Series 2015 (\$63.5M), Series 2018 (\$83M) and Series 2019 (\$102M)



Executive Summary

Specific Meeting Topics

- On May 13, 2021:
 - We visited Dale Jr. High School to tour the completed modernized buildings and quad, with its new shade structures and landscape.
 - We also observed the new 2-story building which was still in progress.
- On September 23, 2021
 - We attended Dale Jr. High School's Grand Opening Ceremony to celebrate the completion of the project and to tour the new 2-story building.
 - We also visited Western High School to tour the newly renovated Incubator Lab (iLab), library and study areas.
- On November 17, 2021
 - We visited Magnolia High School to tour two projects that are under construction.
 - Project 1 Shower/Locker Room Project. We observed the gutted space, wall curbs, and underground utilities ready for concrete slabs.
 - Project 2 Site Improvement Project. We toured the nearly completed project with its new quad, shade and lunch shelters, new landscape, and site furnishings (CARES Act funds).
 - We also visited the site planned for the future 2-story Cybersecurity Building, beginning construction in 2022.

Specific Meeting Topics (continued)

- On February 16, 2022
 - We received a presentation and reviewed the "Draft" Financial and Performance Audits for the year ending June 30, 2021, that was prepared by Eide Bailly, the District's auditing firm. The final audit reports are being presented to the Board of Trustees on March 3, 2022.
 - We received a presentation from LPA regarding the update to the District's Facilities Master Plan (FMP), its process, preliminary findings and milestones. LPA is the architectural firm with expertise in educational facility planning, that is currently leading and facilitating the seven-month long Districtwide facilities master planning process. The FMP provides the District direction for future projects, and assists in developing a roadmap for short and long term facilities development.



Annual Report

Based on our review of the "Draft" Financial and Performance Audit Report dated June 30, 2021, project updates and site visits, we are confident the AUHSD is expending the bond proceeds only for the purposes as set forth in the Measure H Bond Program and not for other purposes. We are satisfied with efforts being made to complete all projects as planned and in a cost-effective manner, and will continue to diligently monitor those efforts.

The Anaheim Union High School District Board of Education established the Citizens' Oversight Committee (COC) by Resolution No. 2014/15-B-02. The Committee is established under the guidelines of Measure H Bond election. Measure H was approved by the voters on November 4, 2014, and authorized the issuance of \$249,000,000 in general obligation bonds for capital improvement projects throughout the District.

<u>Purpose</u>

The purpose of the COC is to inform the public, at least annually in public session, concerning the expenditure of bond proceeds as approved by the voters on November 4, 2014. Bond proceeds may be expended only on capital improvement projects as defined by Exhibit B of Resolution No. 2014/15-B-02.

Committee Duties

The COC actively reviews Measure H expenditures, annual financial and performance audits, financial statements, and staff reports regarding Bond sales, use of the proceeds, and progress of various capital projects that are funded by Measure H proceeds.

The specific activities of the COC includes the following:

- 1. Review, revisions and approval of the Committee Bylaws
- 2. Review of current projects in the Facilities Master Plan, including updates
- 3. Visits to construction sites
- 4. Attend regular meetings as a committee
- 5. Review of various reports and information including:
 - Annual performance and financial audits
 - Quarterly expenditure reports
 - Construction project updates
 - Planning status of future construction projects utilizing Measure H Bond funds
 - Various staff reports

Committee Activities (continued)

- 6. Review of bond series issuance details
- 7. Review of efforts of the District to maximize bond revenues by accessing state matching funds and implementing cost-savings measures
- 8. Adherence to the Brown Act requirements of publicized and open meetings



The Measure H Plan

The Measure H Plan

- \$249M Bond Measure approved by voters in November 2014
- Bonds issued in multiple series over time rather than all at once after the election

Why?

- Issuing bonds too soon before the funds are needed causes higher interest cost, because interest accrues on borrowed funds from the moment of borrowing until repayment
- Issuing bonds over time prevents taxpayers from having to pay more interest costs than necessary
- Going to the bond market at limited times saves on fixed costs involved with the sale of bonds
- With issuing tax-exempt bonds, the District must comply with a federal requirement to plan to spend the bond funds within three years



Three (3) Measure H Bond Series

Given all these facts regarding the timing and amount of bonds, the District found that issuing the bonds in three series over time:

- Satisfied the federal limit of three years
- Gave the opportunity to refine the plan based on the roll out of the Facilities' projects each year
- Reduced the interest costs that taxpayers have to pay
